If your child is absent from school, please contact the school office **EVERY** day of your child's absence. Please either ring the school office and leave a message on the absence line or report your child's absence via the school gateway app.

If you do not contact the school, our Attendance Officer will ring you or send you an email / text. Attendance is monitored on a daily basis and if your child's attendance falls below 92%, s/he will be referred to the Education Welfare Officer, unless there are genuine reasons.

The school day starts at 8.40am. The school gates are open from 8.40am and close at 8.50am. If your child arrives after this time, then you **MUST** take you child to the office to be registered. These procedures are in place to ensure every child is accounted for in the event of an emergency and to ensure the health and safety of your child.

Extended holidays will only be granted in exceptional circumstances; it will NOT be granted for a family holiday!

Year 1

In Year 1 this half-term we have been learning about a range of different materials. We have learnt that materials have different properties for various purposes and have sorted lots of classroom objects. We have continued to learn about childhood by sorting toys from the past with toys from the present day. After learning about toys and materials we also designed our own toy and thought about the most suitable materials to use. In English we thoroughly enjoyed the story 'Ollie and the wind'. We innovated the original by changing the weather type to rain and snow. We created some beautiful rain, wind and snow artwork for our Winter displays based on the story. We also enjoyed our music and movement session with Kim from Kimbles earlier this half-term. We were able to practise our fine and gross motor movements whilst moving to music.





Year 2

It's been another busy term in Year 2! We have really enjoyed learning the text 'Laura's Star' and then creating our own version of the story. The children used conjunctions to join and extend sentences. After this, the children learnt about time connectives and learnt the text 'How to Catch a Star'. From here the children used their imagination and created their own version of something they would want to catch. For example, an Elf or Santa. The children have been learning about Christianity and we have had a lot of fun

learning about Christmas and creating Christmas decorations. During Maths the children have become more fluent with their times table and division fact along with learning about 2D shapes. Keep logging onto Times Table Rock Star! The children also took their Phonics Screening Test in November – Well done children for trying so hard to pass your test. We have noticed the children that are reading at home and making better progress in school so please keep reading with your children and signing their reading record book. We hope you all have a lovely Christmas and New Year.





<u>Year 3</u>

During the second half of the Autumn term, Year 3 have really enjoyed basketball in P.E. and they have really improved their ball skills. We have celebrated Diwali by learning the story of Rama and Sita, making biscuits and creating Rangoli patterns. The children have learnt how



to behave when they are around dogs and how to treat them kindly. In English, we have continued our work on character through "Matilda" and how to write a letter of apology. In maths, we have continued to develop our calculating skills with multiplication and division. Our topic work, has helped the children compare how people lived in the Bronze age and Iron age. We are now celebrating and learning about Christmas by learning carols and making decorations.

Year 4

We started the half term with a fantastic trip to York, it was a very long journey but was well worth it. The animatronic characters were amazingly lifelike and the smells made the whole experience unforgettable. The Year 4 children enjoyed the trip immensely and the Year 4 staff were very impressed with the behaviour and enthusiasm shown by the children. We are now experts on The Vikings, just look at our fact files!

We continued to study Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, we all have our fa-

vourite characters and role-playing Verruca Salt and Augustus Gloop has kept us entertained for hours.

Owen the Poet has been working with us every Monday and will continue to do so until half term, when we will visit the Y Theatre and perform our poems. More information to follow.

Science has been really interesting this term, we have learnt all about our skeletons, our digestive systems and our teeth. A couple of the experiments were rather yucky though, particularly watching the eggs soaked in sugary liquids. Year 4 will all be brushing their teeth at least twice a day after observing those results!

Next term, we start swimming. The Year 4 children will swim on Friday afternoons at the Cossington Sports Centre. We will leave school during lunchtime, walk to the pool, swim and be back in school for hometime.

Winter is here, our displays on Winter Facts have caused quite a lot of interest. We have also talked to the children about staying safe in winter, making sure they can be seen during these murky evenings and not playing on frozen water.

Year 5 have had another fantastic term and have been showing off their reading skills. We are very fortunate to be involved in the library's Our Best Book




competition again this year, which means the children have been reading some amazing new books and they will be voting on their favourite in the next few weeks.

During Remembrance Week in November in our English lessons, the children worked together to create some beautifully emotional and sombre war poems.



Keeping Children Safe Online

All of our children are taught regularly about keeping themselves safe online and they are all able to show their understanding of e-safety by discussing issues with others. All of the children have learned about how it is very important that they are playing games that are appropriate for their age. Look for the PEGI rating symbols, which are similar to the guides for watching films. Games such **as Grand Theft Auto (GTA) and Call of Duty** are **NOT suitable for children**; they are intended only for adults. Please help us keep your children safe by monitoring what they play! Your older children may be playing games that should not be played by younger ones. If you have any questions, please ask Miss Newell or your child's class teacher who will be happy to help you.


Message from Ivan Browne, Director of Public Health Leicester

Dear Parent / Carer,

We now know that the Omicron variant is the fastest spreading form of coronavirus that we have seen so far. Due to significant concerns about it, the Government is introducing new rules across England. There are confirmed cases of Omicron both in Leicester and the county.

We know that we cannot block this variant completely. But it really is important that we slow it down. This allows us to protect more people with booster vaccinations and it will reduce pressure on the NHS.

Covid Plan B Measures

The Government is introducing its Covid Plan B measures in England.

From Friday 10 December, face coverings must be worn in most indoor public venues, including cinemas and theatres. You do not have to wear one when eating, drinking or exercising. From Monday 13 December, you should work from home if you can.

From Wednesday 15 December, to enter a nightclub or large venue you will need to show an NHS Covid Pass showing either proof of vaccination or a negative Covid test.

These measures are to be debated and voted on in parliament. The Government will publish full guidance over the coming days.


