Promoting and Celebrating Good Attendance and Punctuality



Respectful



Free School Meals and Pupil Premium


If parents/carers are in receipt of any government benefits, the school strongly encourages you to apply for free school meals for your child. Even if your child is in Reception, Y1 or Y2 and getting universal infant free school meals, this will help to ensure that your child continues to receive free school meals when s/he is in Y3. For every child who is granted a free school meal entitlement, the school receives £1,385 pupil premium income for every year your child is in school. This money is then used to help support your child's learning. EYFS — Reception



We have had such an exciting term in Reception! The children have been learning the story The Enormous Turnip and have been linking their learning to growing and how things grow from a seed. The children have been asking fantastic questions that made us think where does our food really come from. The children continued to work hard in reception and enjoyed the story of Leon and Bob.

They loved role playing with an imaginary friend and we discussed and learnt about different types of emotions. In maths the children have been enjoying lots of practical ways of learning and are becoming more and more confident each day! The children enjoyed learning about, patterns, capacity and building on number sense knowledge.

We are all enjoying the science activities in class and have made observational drawings of fruit and plants and experimented with what might float or sink. As always, the children love Curriculum Enrichment days and are always eager to get involved and try new activities such as body boards with a mix of Star Wars. We have also had a visit from Creative Learning Services – Wash-day Tuesday, where the children used genuine museum artefacts and discussed the past and the present.

Promoting and Celebrating Good Attendance and Punctuality


At Rushey Mead Primary School we place great importance on good attendance and punctuality. We know that a child's attendance has a direct impact on their learning. Those children who are regularly absent from school and regularly late do not achieve their potential and do fall behind in class. Please support the school in this by ensuring that your child attends school regularly and arrives ready to learn and on time.

Absences should be reported to the school office before 9.15am on the first day of absence. The school monitors attendance on a regular basis, children's attendance that falls below 92% is picked up by the School Attendance Officer and Education Welfare Officer.

It is important for a child to be on time at the beginning of the school day. The school gates open at 8.40am and closes at 8.50am. Lateness can be very disruptive for all children in class. If a child is late and miss's registration, a late mark will be recorded. Obviously, the school will be sympathetic if this is for a good reason. If however a pattern of lateness starts to emerge, parents will be sent a letter and if it does not improve they will be invited to discuss the matter with the Head teacher in order to reach a satisfactory solution

Persistent absence is defined by the Government as attendance below 90%. This equates to 19 days or more absence a year. If a child's attendance drops below 90% this could lead to them becoming a safeguarding concern. We would advise parents / carers not to take their child out of school during term time for holidays so as to not disrupt their learning and more often than not children after these extended holidays will have gaps in their learning, which will affect attainment and progress as they move through the school.

If there is no other alternative, permission is required from the head teacher if you want to take your child out of school during term time as this will be recorded as either an authorised or unauthorised absence. If the absence is unauthorised it could result in the authority taking legal action against parents and could result in a fine or court appearance if a holiday is taken during term time without the school's permission.


Positive People

Year Two

Fir and Chestnut classes have had a very busy Spring term learning about the British coastline. We were delighted to have Katie from the Leicestershire Museum Services come to visit and talk to the children about the seaside of the past. She brought many artefacts to show us in addition to which, the children had fun dressing-up in seaside costumes and making a simple Victorian style paper spinner's. The children have also constructed their own mini beach huts. They practiced different ways in which card constructions can be strengthened and thought about the ways in which these could help their beach huts maintain strength and stability.

In English the children have enjoyed listening and exploring the texts 'The Lighthouse Keepers Tea' and the traditional tale 'The Elves and the Shoemaker.' They have written letters, diary entries and an innovated story.

In Maths, Year 2 continue to strengthen their working knowledge of numbers to one hundred. They have also learnt how to read scales in weight and length and to count money.

Looking forward to next term, Year 2 will be completing their SATs tests. To support them in English and Maths, we have looked at past papers and have been guiding them in how best to approach these papers.

DSP - Bonsai Class



Our topic this half term in Bonsai Class has been 'How many colours in the rainbow?'. The children have carried out lots of art activities around colour and have become more confident with signing the different colours of the rainbow as well as exploring mixing colours together.



In English the children have been learning the story of The Rainbow Fish to link with this theme. We have really enjoyed learning the different Makaton signs for the different animals that we see in the sea. The children have also started to show a good understanding of using colourful semantics to construct a simple sentence. In Maths, the children have continued to practise recognising and counting numbers forwards and backwards to 10, continuing patterns, naming 2D shapes and positional language.

The Rainbows Nurture children had fun making their Easter bonnets this week ready for the Easter Bonnet Parade today!


As the children learn academically and socially they develop confidence, become responsive to others, learn self-respect and take pride in behaving well and in achieving.






Year 6

Year 6 have had a busy and interesting term. During an Art day, which was linked to our Frozen Kingdoms theme, pupils learnt to create artwork in the style of Inuit artists. The result was some fantastic stencil art, animal models carved out of clay and a painting.



The pupils also enjoyed a DT day with a focus on engineering. They learnt all about strengthening bridges and were challenged to work in groups to design and build a bridge that would then be tested to measure how much weight it would hold – the results were quite amazing. Of course, hard work to prepare for the SATs carries on.



We continue to have a number of complaints from residents living on Magnus Road where some parents /carers are parking in people's driveways and on the pavement making it difficult for these residents to leave their own homes. Some parent / carers are also parking on the pavement or on the yellow / zig-zag lines outside the school gates.

This can be problematic if a resident wants to use their own vehicle and leave their house, especially if there is an emergency, in particular a medical / fire emergency where someone's health and safety is concerned. Not to mention the dangers this may cause pedestrians and putting our children's lives at risk with careless parking and driving!



While parking in someone else's drive is not a criminal offence, it does count as trespassing, which is a civil offence! This means the resident can pursue a civil case against the driver parking their car for trespassing.

We suggest and advise that parents and carers park their vehicles in Rushey Fields car park when dropping off or collecting their children, which is only a short walk from the school.

Residents living in and around the school community would very much appreciate this so that cars are parked away from people's driveways and on nearby pavements during school drop off and pick up times.

Please abide by the rules and park safely and considerately.
