Promoting and Celebrating Good Attendance and Punctuality



At Rushey Mead Primary School we place great importance on good attendance and punctuality.


We know that a child's attendance has a direct impact on their learning. Those children who are regularly absent from school and regularly late do not achieve their potential and do fall behind in class. Please support the school in this by ensuring that your child attends school regularly and arrives ready to learn and on time.

Absences should be reported to the school office before 9.15am on the first day of absence. The school monitors attendance on a regular basis, children's attendance that falls below 92% is picked up by the School Attendance Officer, Mrs Mehta.

It is important for a child to be on time at the beginning of the school day. The school gates open at 8.40am and closes at 8.50am. Lateness can be very disruptive for all children in class. If a child is late and miss's registration, a late mark will be recorded. Obviously, the school will be sympathetic if this is for a good reason. If however a pattern of lateness starts to emerge, parents will be sent a letter and if it does not improve they will be invited to discuss the matter with the Head teacher in order to reach a satisfactory solution.

Persistent absence is defined by the Government as attendance below 90%. This equates to 19 days or more absence a year. If a child's attendance drops below 90% this could lead to them becoming a safeguarding concern. We would advise parents / carers not to take their child out of school during term time for holidays so as to not disrupt their learning and more often than not children after these extended holidays will have gaps in their learning, which will affect attainment and progress as they move through the school.

If there is no other alternative, permission is required from the head teacher if you want to take your child out of school during term time as this will be recorded as either an authorised or unauthorised absence. If the absence is unauthorised it could result in the authority taking legal action against parents and could result in a fine or court appearance if a holiday is taken during term time without the school's permission.

Some of the many fantastic activities were:





The children have settled in really well this term and are getting to grips with nursery routines! We have enjoyed exploring our new environment and making new friends.






Bonsai Class (DSP - Designated Specialist Provision)

Reception children have also been learning about their immediate school surroundings and their home city of Leicester. They have used simple maps to identify key features in the school grounds and have learnt to recognise some to the notable buildings in Leicester. Many of the children recognised the National Space Centre but were excited to learn that there is a huge dinosaur skeleton in the New Walk Museum here in Leicester.

Reception have welcomed many visitors this half term. There have been visits from a nurse, a crossing patrol officer, firefighters, paramedics and a vet. The children listened very carefully as each of our visitors explained about their work. All were lucky enough to try on the uniforms, including the helmets. The children particularly enjoyed squirting the hose of the fire engine and making the sirens sound. These visits have given the children fresh ideas about the type of career they would like to have when they grow up.

In English, Reception have shared many stories and have started to make progress in identifying each phonic sounds and retelling stories using actions. In Maths, the children have been learning about 2D shape as well as recognising and naming each numeral and securing their counting through joining in with number songs and rhymes.

Finally, we would like to thank parents for supporting children by aiding them to learn their lines and joining us for our final performance of 'Wiggly Nativity'. The children have worked so hard and we are all very proud of them.



In science, Year 2 have been learning about human survival and habitats. They investigated and researched what humans, plants and animals need to survive. The children enjoyed exploring a local habitat in the forest school area.

We have explored significant individuals in history and looked at the impact they have had on how we live today. We particularly enjoyed learning about Rosa Parks and Neil Armstrong. We explored the world we live in for our Geography unit and learnt how to use maps and atlases.

It was lovely to meet so many of you during our Diwali celebrations and Parents Evenings.


Ning Nang Nong by Spike Miligan

Our first term in Key Stage 2 has been very busy but it has been a lot of fun too!

The Year 3 children started the term by reading the book, The Three Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig and children really enjoyed this and wrote some humorous endings of their own for the story! We then went on to Stone Age Boy which linked with our History learning on the Stone Age. The children learned how to use inverted commas to punctuate speech. We are now using our learning from History to write a non-chronological report in English.

We even had a visit from Leicester Libraries, where the children experienced a bit of life in the Stone Age.

Our Science topic on Animal Nutrition and the Skeletal System was interesting, the children learned how their bodies moved and the importance of having a skeleton.

Computing has been particularly enjoyable with our work on making and editing videos. The children used CapCut to clip and cut sections but also to add laser eyes, fluorescent spikey hair and brightly coloured faces.

On a more serious note, we continue to teach the children Online Safety to ensure they know and understand how and why they need to be safe when using devices.

Next term, we will start a new topic in History and Science and there is an exciting trip coming up too!

The Year 3 team would like to wish everyone a safe and happy holiday and we look forward to welcoming the children back in January.





With Accelerated Reader, all the children in Key Stage 2 read an Accelerated Reader (AR) book then take an online quiz, which provides immediate feedback on their understanding of the book. Children respond to regular feedback from their class teacher and are motivated to make progress with their independent reading skills as teachers in Key Stage 2 monitor how often they read and allow the children to change their AR book on regular basis.



The Importance of Swimming



Swimming and water safety are compulsory parts of the National Curriculum at primary school to make sure that children are well equipped to enjoy swimming and know how to keep safe in and around water.



The Year 6 swimming data for the 2023-2024 academic year shows that our children are becoming much more able and confident in the water.

This cohort of children were the first cohort to have 3 years of adult support in the pool at Cossington Street Sports Centre. The data is similar to last year's data except there was a slightly lower number of children who could swim 25m this year but more children successfully performing the safe self-rescue skills. This could be partially explained by the larger percentage of pupils who do not swim outside of school compared to last year (there has been of 18% increase).

However, compared to 2020-2021, the final year of children receiving no adult support in the pool, I hope that you can agree the data looks much better and reflects the progress that our school and children have made in swimming!


This has led to some of the children borrowing other books by Louis Sachar and Lauren St John from the school and Belgrave Library.
